Participants will explore ways to build community and inspire curiosity while preparing students for academic and personal growth abroad. Attendees will leave with tools and a clear framework for crafting orientations that both inform and inspire, ensuring students embark with confidence, cultural awareness, and excitement for their journey.

Igniting Learning and Adventure: Ensuring Academic Outcomes in Short-Term, Immersive Study Abroad Programs

Short-term study abroad programs, often 10–14 days, risk prioritizing sightseeing and excursions over meaningful academic engagement. This session explores strategies to guarantee academic outcomes while delivering immersive cultural experiences and fun activities. Participants will examine design principles for structuring tight itineraries that integrate reflection, experiential learning, and rigorous assessments alongside excursions. Attendees will leave with practical tools to create short-term programs where students engage deeply, connect cultural experiences to course objectives, and enjoy immersive, memorable experiences without compromising academic integrity.

Stuck in Limbo: How Universities Can Navigate Visa Delays & Denials for International Students & Employees

Strategies for handling 221(g) delays, administrative processing, and consular denials. What schools can (and can't) do, and how to set expectations with departments and international students/employees. Visa delays and denials can derail international students' studies, disrupt faculty hiring, and create significant uncertainty for departments and HR offices. With consular backlogs, 221(g) administrative processing, and visa refusals on the rise, universities must be prepared to manage expectations and provide clear, compliant guidance.

FCIE and Florida's Flirtation with Global Education

This session will provide context for the creation of the Florida Consortium for International Education, which is now merging with FAIE to form one stronger statewide organization. In the late 1970's and early 1980's there was a great deal of focus in secondary and higher education on the need for Florida's citizens to be globally literate and improve foreign language instruction. The Florida Collegiate Consortium for International/Intercultural Education (later FCIE) was formed in 1977. A state commission was formed in 1981 to create a path forward to promote Global Education which was adopted by the Florida Dept of Education in 1982. In 1986 the Florida legislature passed the International Education Bill which established the Office of International Education and led to the creation of the Florida Linkage Institutes and the Latin American Caribbean Basin Scholarship Program. These

initiatives were supported in a bi-partisan way and were widely popular. Forty years later, the pendulum has swung in the opposite direction. Can Global Education ever make a comeback in Florida?

Mental Health & Well-Being for College/University Advisors & International Education Professionals

International educators juggle compliance, student advocacy, cultural sensitivity, and crisis response—all while meeting institutional expectations. While rewarding, this work often leads to compassion fatigue, burnout, and blurred personal boundaries. This session explored the impact of emotional labor on advisors and reframed self-care as essential for long-term success. Participants reflected on burnout, learned practical strategies for resilience, and discussed ways to foster supportive workplace cultures. The session emphasized that by prioritizing our own well-being—and drawing strength from FAIE and this conference community—we sustain ourselves and strengthen our ability to serve students with compassion, balance, and purpose. The session will end with a guided meditation and relaxation exercise.

3:20-4:20 pm: Breakout Session 4

Unlocking New Flightpaths (UNF): Leveraging Technology to Expand Study Abroad Accessibility and Capacity

This session explores how innovative technology can remove barriers, streamline processes, and scale participation in study abroad. Designing Responsible Study Abroad Programs for A Changing World

This session explores how to design study abroad programs that integrate environmental responsibility into every stage of planning. Using examples from European field programs, we'll discuss reducing carbon footprints through intentional choices we'll discuss reducing impacts through intentional choices in transportation, accommodations, logistics, and student activities. The presentation will also highlight provider initiatives, practical strategies, and ways to encourage student accountability (such as carbon-offset programs). Attendees

will leave with examples to rethink their own programs while balancing cultural immersion, academic quality, and global responsibility.

This session will facilitate meaningful conversations about how educators can help international students overcome obstacles and gain confidence as they pursue their academic goals.
